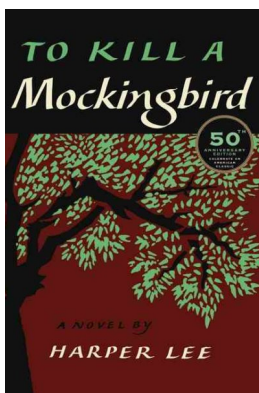


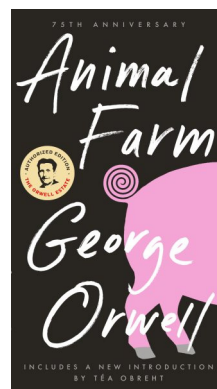

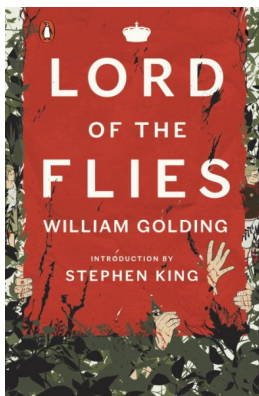
To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee

The explosion of racial hate in an Alabama town is viewed by a little girl whose father defends a black man accused of rape.



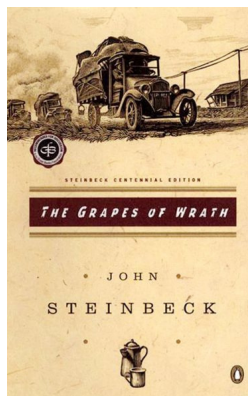
Animal Farm by George Orwell

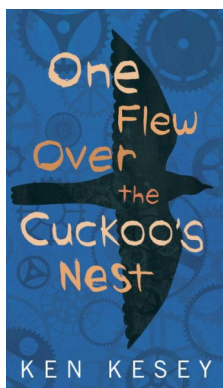
Lord of the Flies by William Golding

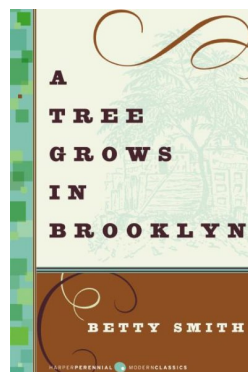
The Grapes of Wrath by John Steinbeck

First published in 1939, Steinbeck's Pulitzer Prize-winning epic of the Great Depression chronicles the Dust Bowl migration of the 1930s and tells the story of one Oklahoma farm family.



One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest by Ken Kesey

McMurphy, a criminal who feigns insanity, is admitted to a mental hospital where he challenges the autocratic authority of the head nurse.



A Tree Grows in Brooklyn by Betty Smith

A Tree Grows in Brooklyn is a semi-autobiographical 1943 novel focusing on an impoverished but aspirational adolescent girl and her family living in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, New York City, during the first two decades of the 20th century.
