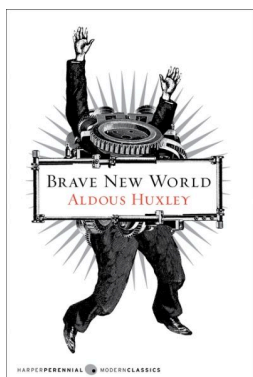




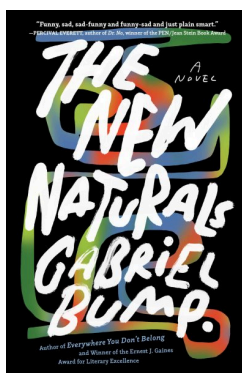

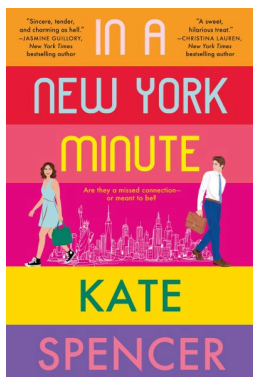
Brave New World by Aldous Huxley

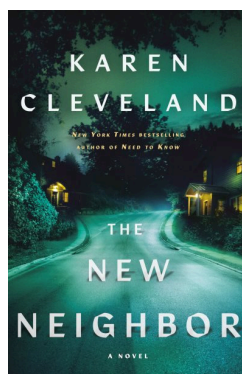
The New Natural by Gabriel Bump

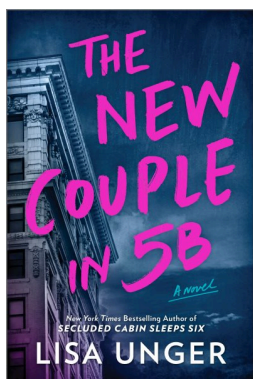
In a New York Minute by Kate Spencer
